

## LESSON 8 D, A, E, AND B MAJOR AND MINOR FIVE-FINGER PATTERNS AND TRIADS

**D Major, A Major,** and **E Major** five-finger patterns are similar. Each triad includes a sharp on the third (the middle note). On the keyboards below, the notes that make the triads are circled.

What is the name of that sharp? G#


Bh Major five-finger pattern has two flats: Bh and Eh. On the keyboard below, the notes that make the triad are circled.

2. Add sharps or flats before the notes to complete these five-finger patterns.






To change D Major, A Major, and E Major five-finger patterns into minor, the sharp on the third (the middle note) is removed.



To change the Bb Major five-finger pattern into **bb minor**, a **flat is added to the third (the D)**.




3. Change these Major five-finger patterns into minor five-finger patterns. Draw the five-finger pattern in the empty measure, and lower the third a half-step. The first one is given.




4. Change these triads from Major to minor. Draw each triad in the empty measure and lower the third a half-step.



5. Name these five-finger patterns. The first one is given.




